"Do you not say there are yet four months then comes the harvest? Look, I tell you, lift up your eyes and see that the fields are white for harvest." (John 4:35)

Lift up your eyes and see – these are the words of Jesus to his disciples, after Jesus' encounter with the Samaritan woman at the well, and they are words for us today. While reading about the importance of "vision" in preparation for my missionary strategies class, I was reminded of this truth, that before Jesus sent out the disciples with the great commission, first they had to lift up their eyes and see the fields. They needed to be captivated by the vision before they could be effective in fulfilling this commission. Today as I was walking in my neighborhood, I prayed that God would help me to see where He was working, to give me eyes to see the fields ready for harvest, that His supernatural love would overflow through me to my neighbors, that God would open doors to share the gospel to share His love with them, and that many would embrace His love and place their faith in Christ alone for salvation.

EMMANUEL BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY – I continue to teach online classes from home. I finished Theology of the Holy Spirit in our bachelors' degree program, and recently began teaching two classes on Saturdays — Personal Evangelism and Missionary Strategies. In July we had our graduation ceremony. Twelve students graduated this year, and I was honored to be asked to participate in the virtual ceremony by introducing some of the graduates. Our seminary has bi-weekly online prayer meetings, and I am grateful to participate and to have been invited to lead some meetings. I was asked to help develop a mentoring program for the seminary. I wrote up a basic outline and look forward to receiving input from others on how we can best help our students grow and be successful in ministry.

GETSEMANI CHURCH -- Our church continues to have online church services and other devotional and prayer transmissions during the week. Our Wednesday women's bible study group has not met in person since the covid outbreak, but we have been in contact via whatsapp with encouraging messages, Scripture, and sharing prayer requests and answers to prayer. The work God began in these women He will continue to bring to completion. I look forward to when we can be together again in person.

FACTOR FE CHURCH—We continue to have weekly online Sunday services and prayer meetings. A few weeks ago, we also began an online weekly study on the book CHAZOWN by Craig Groeschel. It invites us to reflect on our past experiences, core values, and spiritual gifts to discover our life purpose. It has been good to interact and encourage one another in this process of spiritual growth.

NEIGHBORS — I have connected and developed friendships with neighbors as I walk in our community. One mom walks every day with her kids, and several walk their dogs. One neighbor's daughter was to start online university classes in July. I wrote down the date she was to start. When I saw that neighbor and asked how things were going, she was surprised that I remembered! She was glad that I asked and was excited to share that things were going well in her daughter's beginning of her university life. I often run into a couple walking with their dog and cat. He is a pilot, and she has a relative with covid. Once while walking I noticed a birthday party going on outside a house for a 2-yr old girl. The mom approached me, called me by name and offered me birthday cake! I was amazed she remembered my name! Once I ran into a young woman who I had met before from the state of Guanajuato. We had talked before about our memories of Guanajuato, but this day she was moving out! She had only lived

here for a year, and I did not see her very often. That day I noticed she had a tattoo on her arm ("always friends") and asked what it was about. She said she had a best friend die in an accident last year (age 25) so in her memory decided to get a tattoo. I said," life is short, and we never know." I went back to my house to get snacks and a tract, hoping to talk more with her about spiritual things, but when I went back to her house, she had already left with the movers. She gave me her garbage can, so whenever I see it, I am reminded to pray for her. I am part of two different whatsapp groups with neighbors and have developed friendships with many. I pray that these relationships continue to develop, for opportunities to show Christ's love and for open doors to share the gospel.

NATIONAL AND REGIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTIONS -- We have had online conferences and meetings on different topics — updates on how and when we can open our churches safely, theology, some pastors (that are also doctors) shared on health issues, covid and the family. A psychologist shared on the psychological impact of covid. It has been good to see, network and encourage one another. Several pastors of our national convention of Baptist churches in Mexico have died of covid, floods have destroyed other regions of the country, and covid has left its mark on the economy. We pray for Mexico, these families and churches, that God would lead, guide and provide as we all wait on Him.

PRAYER AND PRAISE: 1. Praise for friendships with neighbors and prayer for open doors to share the gospel. 2. Pray that God would use me to help develop leaders for His glory as I teach my seminary classes. 3. Pray for Mexico during covid-19 – that God would use His churches in creative ways to impact the communities with the gospel, for protection from the virus, for the economical impact, for grieving families, for corruption and violence to decrease, and for God to draw many to faith in Him. I just heard of the death to covid of a 59-year old friend in Mazatlan, with whom I had shared the gospel years ago. God knows his heart. 4. Pray for good health, energy, and safety. 5. Pray for wisdom in all ministry decisions. 6. Pray for God to continue to provide resources for my ministry with the new financial system. 7. One of my *cuatas* friends in Irapuato (I used to have weekly brunch and bible study with a group of women) her husband just died of covid. I pray for that family and all my *cuatas* that God would continue to draw many to Himself by faith. 8. Once walking out of the grocery store, I talked to an older woman selling woven baskets, etc. Later, I committed that if I were ever to see her again, that I would share Christ if God so leads. A week later I saw her, shared with her, and gave her a tract. I pray that God would help her understand what it means to have a relationship with Him, that these gospel seeds planted would take root and grow, and that she would place her faith in Christ.

August 2020 Adapting

Five months have passed since Barb and I returned to Indonesia. We were anticipating renewing relationships with our Indonesian colleagues and friends. As we reported earlier, upon arrival we were confronted with many changes brought about by the global COVID-19 pandemic. The restrictions on gatherings, use of masks, and social distancing continue. Just a few days ago, government authorities yet again extended their mandated regulations to halt the spread of the virus.

Delays have also been part of adapting upon our return. Every year we are required to renew our visa to live in Indonesia. This time around the renewal process was slowed by the closure of government offices due to the pandemic. We hoped to see the renewal completed by the time our current documents expired at the end of April. Unfortunately, the renewal process was delayed. *However*, the good news is we completed the registration process (photos and fingerprinting) in the middle of July. By the time this letter arrives, you can join us in thanking God for watching over us and allowing us to remain in Indonesia for another year.

Beyond all the adjustments with the pandemic, we have experienced changes in our approaches to ministry. In June, FEBC leadership announced the International Service Team (IST), through which we've been serving, is being disbanded. Rather than providing support from the central IST, regional assistance will be shared among the local FEBC operations from

nearby countries. Those of us on the central team have reverted back to our home organizations, in our case FEBC-USA. Barb's role in leading the IST Admin Team is no longer needed. So she is stepping back from active FEBC ministry in favor of her Bible study ministries within our local church. Bob's new role is still being negotiated. We are finalizing an agreement between FEBC and Operation Mobilization (OM). OM focuses on introducing Jesus to 1/3 of the world's population still unreached. Bob will be assisting OM ministry teams as they incorporate media into their outreach strategies. We will remain FEBC missionaries under this agreement.

These transitions are being complicated by our current financial support levels. While our missionary account (called a memo record) has a positive balance, our current monthly income level does not quite meet all of our expenses. Our recent visit to the US for home assignment provided a small boost, but we also learned of recent changes that will diminish our income by another 7%.

To stabilize our memo record as we move into this next chapter of ministry, we will need an additional \$1,000/month. Please consider how you could be part of the solution by a regular contribution to our support or by inviting others you know to become a part of our team. 
I'm so thankful God is providing these opportunities to interact meaningfully even in the midst of a pandemic! We're so grateful for your prayers and partnership!


